## • Letter From the Cabinet

Thus far, 2024 has been a lively and fruitful year for the Lambda Iota Chapter. Since the last edition, the brothers continued the Spring 24 semester enjoying one another's company all over the country! In late February, we hosted the annual Purple Garter in Nashville. Over Spring Break, groups of brothers went to Cancun, Vail, Fort Lauderdale, St. Pete, and Marco Island. We wrapped it up in West Lafayette with Mom's Day; a joyful, fun-filled weekend featuring an auction and musical chairs. Special thanks to the Mary McCarty Mom's Club volunteers for all their efforts.

During the Spring 24 semester, the brothers also performed well in the classroom with a house-wide average GPA of 3.25 (our highest since Spring of 2020). This placed Lambda Iota 9th overall among all fraternities and 4th among houses with over 100 members. The Chapter also received a certificate of Superior Academic Achievement from Phi Gamma Delta International Headquarters for exceeding the all-men's GPA average for the past 24 consecutive years!

Over the summer, the Chapter hosted 2 rush events. One virtual zoom meeting with an accompanying presentation and an in-person event in Carmel, Indiana (special thanks to Brother Sam Stewart (2027) and his family for hosting). This new, early recruitment is a trend the Chapter plans to continue, especially due to the new expectations regarding the new member process.

In early August, brothers Mitchell Weckman (2026), Carter Koob (2026), James Klekovkin (2026), Sam Hood (2026), and Bill Miller traveled to Chicago for the 176th Ekklesia. Here, the main objective was to clean up and finalize the bylaws language after the implementation of the New Model at the last Ekklesia. Small changes were made to Initiation and the Invitation Ceremony (which takes the place of the Pledging Ceremony), all with the importance of tradition at the forefront of our minds.

Now having returned to campus for the Fall, Lambda Iota is off to a hot start. Brother Bill Gettings organized a graduate-undergrad golf outing at the Ackerman-Allen Purdue course which gathered many Graduate Brothers. As Halloween approaches, the brothers are excited to kick off our first two big events of the year. First, we're hosting a halloween costume dance on-board Madam Carroll, the largest registered boat in Indiana, at Lake Freeman. Second,

### • Brother Spotlight - Kyle Johnson (2025)

Kyle Ronald Johnson is a senior from Boston, MA studying Construction Engineering. As a first generation college student, Kyle entered Purdue with limited knowledge of what to expect from his college experience. Despite this, he has excelled in all aspects of his life, from leadership and academics to building relationships and deepening his faith.

During his time at 640 N Russell, Kyle has held several leadership positions including Rush Co-chair (2024), Brotherhood Chair (Sp 2024), Treasurer (2023), New Member Educator (2022), and Scholarship Chair (2022). As Rush Chair, Kyle takes pride in shaping the future of the house by organizing recruitment events and carefully selecting the members of PC28. While serving as Treasurer, his primary responsibilities included managing the chapter's budget but his most significant contribution was in the leadership and insight he brought

to the cabinet. As New Member Educator, he guided the new pledge class into the house and life as a college student, preaching the importance of brotherhood and self-discipline.

Kyle's focus on academic and professional achievement is equally impressive. He made the significant leap from Massachusetts to Purdue to pursue a degree in engineering as a first-generation student, and though the transition was challenging, his determination has led to success in his studies. This past summer, he pushed himself further by studying abroad in Prague, embracing the opportunity to grow in a new environment. In addition to majoring in Construction Engineering, Kyle will graduate with minors in Business Economics and Management, which will support his goals in project management and position him for leadership roles in business. Over the last two summers, he interned with Arco Murray in Chicago as a Project Management Intern (thanks in part to Graduate Brother Liam Bettez (2020), who helped connect Kyle and other brothers with internships at Arco). Next summer, Kyle will join the company as a full-time employee. His drive to take on greater responsibilities, whether in the classroom or the industry, is evident in all he does.

What truly sets Kyle apart are his personal commitments, many of which go unnoticed by most. Kyle wakes up at 5am everyday to workout and makes it a priority to maintain close relationships, regularly calling his parents, sister, grandparents and hometown friends. Kyle places deep value on his friendships with those closest to him. In addition, Kyle is heavily involved in Fiji Faith (undergraduate weekly bible study). He mentioned that his personal faith story has helped him overcome tough times and given him a roadmap to life. He deeply values the role his faith plays in his decision making and his confidence. It has allowed him to bet on himself and demand

#### ♦ Fiji Racing 2025

Fiji Racing is back again for the 68<sup>th</sup> Running of the Purdue Grand Prix (April 2025)! Earlier this year at 67<sup>th</sup> running (April 2024), the team introduced a brand-new chassis looking for race winning speed. Caden Taylor (2025) qualified 12<sup>th</sup> before driving up to the 4<sup>th</sup> position just 40 laps into the 160-lap race. Just before bringing the #64 to pit road for a mid-race pit stop, the kart suffered a mechanical failure in the front end that forced an early retirement from the race while running inside the top 5 out of 33 karts. Although this was not the result the team was looking for, the speed was very promising and ironing out issues is part of improving as a team.

Additionally, for the first time in history Purdue allowed a second race in the fall to occur at the Purdue Grand Prix track, known as the Halloween Hundred, and this 100-lap race showed the true pace attainable by the team. On October 12, Caden Taylor qualified 3<sup>rd</sup> and proceeded to run near the front for the opening stint of the race. Near lap 30 while navigating lapped traffic, Caden's shoulder seat belts became loose, and he struggled to stay in the kart while driving around the tight Purdue circuit. Between the heat and physical effort required to stay safely in the kart, he made the decision to come into the pits, where members of the team promptly gave Caden a chance to rest and fix the belts. After going a few laps down, Caden got back into the kart and

drove the remaining 60 laps. During this period, he was the fastest kart on track and passed the eventual winner of the race. In the end, the team recovered to 11<sup>th</sup> and finished the race. A bittersweet result with the pace the kart had, but great momentum for the 68<sup>th</sup> Purdue Grand Prix in April and a great example of the determination by the team and Caden Taylor to get back out on track.

For the first time since the team's reinstatement, Fiji Racing had a full team led by Adam Cox (2026) and containing members from the 2025, 2026, and 2027 pledge classes. Without the help of Lucas Gary (2026), Leo Strong (2027), Luke Linden (2025), Hayden Gunckel (2027), Conner Hamilton (2027), and Charlie Assalley (2027) this would not have been attainable. Additionally, a special thanks must be given to Bennett Taylor (1996)

for his continued assistance of Fiji Racing. Each member and supporter of this team deserves recognition for their help and support.


(Ross-Ade Pavilion). Please lookout for an official Pig Dinner invitation and RSVP form in the coming weeks.
